Exeter's literary past goes back a long way and Exeter Cathedral library houses the largest known collection of Old English literature still in existence - The Exeter Book.

Quay Words is a core project of the UNESCO programme giving us the chance to show off Exeter's literary present and support its future for writers and readers.

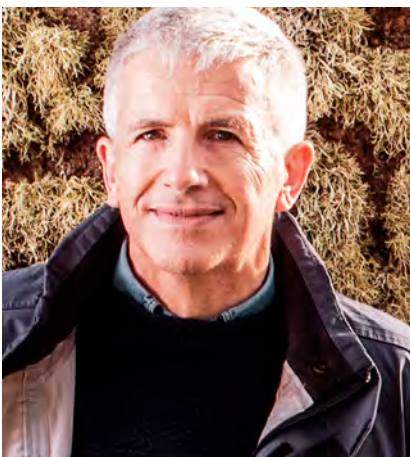
AUTUMN 2020 WELLBEING

15-16 February

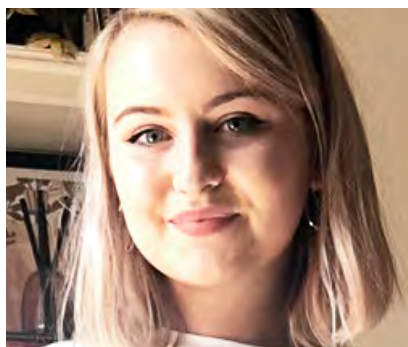
We'll be running two day-long zine-making workshops for young people aged 14-18 to stretch their DIY imaginations, with zine-maker **Laura Moseley**.

EXETER CUSTOM HOUSE

Exeter Custom House was built in 1680 at the height of Exeter's woollen cloth industry. Exeter has had a quay since Roman times. During the 13th and 14th centuries, rival merchants built weirs across the river near Topsham to prevent cargoes reaching Exeter. Between 1564 and 1566, John Trew built the first stretch of the Exeter Canal to enable delivery of cargo closer to the city. The increase in trade led to the construction of the Custom House in 1680.

Renowned for its sweeping staircase and ornate plaster ceilings, this beautiful building now houses a visitor centre. There are many stories to be discovered in the Custom House's long past – and now we have a fleet of writers ready to uncover them. project which also has support from Arts Council England.



EXETER CANAL AND QUAY TRUST



Established in 1981, Exeter Canal and Quay Trust (ECQT) is a registered charity committed to developing Exeter Quayside as a vibrant destination for residents and visitors. It has devoted the past 40 years to the conservation and regeneration of a significant portfolio of historic buildings in the Quay area.

The Grade I listed Custom House is the Trust's flagship building, which provides the perfect historic location for Quay Words. ECQT is keen to promote and celebrate the cultural life of Exeter and the quayside. Therefore, ECQT is delighted to have commissioned Literature Works to create and deliver the Quay Words project which also has support from Arts Council England.
